



Year 3 Blue Autumn 2: Where do the Romans Fit in Time?

<p>The calendar we use today was started by Julius Caesar, a Roman ruler. It is based on the movement of the earth around the sun, and so is called the solar calendar. The names of our months are taken from the names of Roman gods and rulers. The month 'July,' in fact, is named after Julius Caesar himself!</p>	<p>centurion</p>	<p>A commander of a group of 100 Roman soldiers.</p>	
<p>The Roman Empire was huge and included millions of people living over a large area. How did they keep track of all these people? Easy! They counted them! The Roman Empire began the practice of taking a census, or a 'count,' of all the people within its boundaries every so often. Today, many countries like ours take a census every 10 years.</p>	<p>emperor</p>	<p>The Roman emperor was the ruler of the Roman Empire during the imperial period.</p>	
	<p>aqueduct</p>	<p>A large system for carrying water from one place to another is called an aqueduct.</p>	
	<p>gladiator</p>	<p>A gladiator was an armed combatant who entertained audiences in the Roman Republic.</p>	
	<p>conquer</p>	<p>To overcome and take control of people or land using military force.</p>	
	<p>invade</p>	<p>Enter a place or land with the intention of occupying it.</p>
